

Notable Deaths List

ART CARNEY-85-The slightly off-center sewer worker who, together with Jackie Gleason, brought laughter and joy into homes every week in the 50's "Honeymooners"

BOBBY HATFIELD-63-a "Righteous" brother who, through song, taught us we should never lose that "lovin' feelin'."

PAT TILLMAN-27- the defensive back for the NFL Arizona Cardinals who left a 3.6 million dollar contract nine months after 9/11 to enlist in the army. Corporal Tillman was killed in action on April 22nd in Afghanistan.

ALAN KING-76-The comic with Chutzpah

JACK PAAR-85-the prickly, often emotional and always unpredictable father of late-night television and former host of the Tonight Show from 1957-62.

GEORGE ELLIOTT-85-The Army Private whose warning about aircraft approaching Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, went unheeded.

BOB KEESHAN-76-The original Clara Bell the Clown on the old "Howdy Doody" show, but better known as the gentle, patient Captain Kangaroo

TUG MCGRAW-59-The colorful lefthanded relief pitcher who helped the 1980 Philadelphia Phillies win the World Series, and the father of country music star, Tim McGraw.

JAN BERRY-62-the creative force behind the singing duo "Jan & Dean" and together with the Beach Boys, a pioneer of the 60's surf music

SIR PETER USTINOV-82-the wit and charm that created a 60-year career as an actor, playwright, novelist, and director.

ESTEE LAUDER-97-The daughter of a French Catholic mother and Hungarian Jewish father who was the last great independent titan of the cosmetics industry.

TONY RANDALL-84-Born Leonard Rosenberg in Tulsa, OK, led a successful comic career on stage, screen, and most notably as Felix Ungar in the classic television series, "The Odd Couple."

MARLON BRANDO-80-Acclaimed as the greatest actor of his generation, he is best remembered for his performances in "On The Waterfront" and "The Godfather."

ELISABETH KUBLER-ROSS-78-the psychiatrist whose pioneering work with the terminally ill helped to revolutionize attitudes toward dying, who wrote in her autobiography, "I always say that death can be one of the greatest experiences ever. If you live each day of your life right, then you have nothing to fear. The body dies, but not the soul."

RAY CHARLES-73-the Grammy-winning crooner who blended gospel and blues in such crowd-pleasers as *What'd I Say* and heartfelt ballads like *Georgia on My Mind*. Blind by age 7 and an orphan at 15,

Julia Child * 92-America's first celebrity chef, who single-handedly changed the way we think about food in this country. With a dozen cookbooks to her credit and untold hours of delightful television shows, she demonstrated her mastery of French cooking with unparalleled grace and ease. We thank her for her contributions to the culinary world, and especially for teaching us to savor life.
